



Review questions:

- 1. Who is God's son? (Jesus)
- 2. Who wrote the book of Ephesians? (Paul)
- 3. According to Ephesians 2:8-9, it is by _____ we have been saved. (grace)
- 4. Is God's love something you have to earn? (No, His love is a gift.)
- 5. Who messes up? Who makes mistakes? (everyone)
- 6. True or False, God expects me to do the right thing all the time and then He will let me have a relationship with Him. (FALSE!)
- 7. Who is Jesus and what did He do? (Jesus is God's Son. He came to take our place by dying on the cross so that we could have a relationship with God forever.)

What You Say:

"Thankfully, we don't have to do anything to earn God's love. In Ephesians, Paul teaches us that **[Bottom Line] Jesus is a gift for everyone.** God sent His only Son, Jesus, for everyone!

"God loves us, even though we mess up and aren't perfect. We call that imperfection 'sin.' And that sin separates us from God because He is holy and perfect. Jesus came to pay the price for sin by dying on the cross and coming back to life three days later! He paid the price for the sin that separates us from God so we could have a relationship with Him! Jesus fixed that separation forever. You don't have to earn your way into a relationship with Him. You don't have to be good enough, or perfect enough, or smart enough. God made you and He loves you SO much.

Jesus came for everyone. There isn't anything you can do to make God love you more than He already does. Jesus gave His life so that EVERYONE could be forgiven and have a relationship with God forever. Just like you don't have to do anything to 'earn' the gifts you receive on your birthday or at Christmas, *[Bottom Line]* Jesus is a gift for everyone."

What You Do:

• Look up and read Ephesians 2:8 in the Bible

What You Say:

"God sent Jesus to pay the price for our sin. We cannot earn our way into a relationship with God by doing the right thing, following the rules, or being good. God's grace is a gift. **[Bottom Line] Jesus is a gift for everyone.**

"Our relationship with God isn't based on what we do. It's based on what Jesus has done. When we understand that Jesus came as a gift, and we put our trust in Him as Savior, we can have a relationship with God forever. We don't have to do enough good things in order to have a relationship with God. *[Bottom Line]* Jesus is a gift for everyone."

[Make it Personal] (Tell the kids about a time when you misunderstood today's bottom line. Maybe you were trying to please God by doing all the right things, or being perfect, or keeping track of all the good things you did, etc. Talk about how you learned that God's love isn't something you earn but something you receive as a gift and how you chose to trust Jesus as your Savior.)

What You Do:


• Write a one or two sentence prayer that thanks God for sending Jesus for everyone.

What You Say:

"We usually talk about Jesus being the best gift ever at Christmas! It's fun to think about this gift, the best gift ever, in the middle of the summer. We can celebrate the gift of Jesus every day. Let's pray.

Read the written prayers and then close with the prayer below:

"Heavenly Father, you are an awesome, powerful, and loving God. Help each of us understand that we do not have to earn your love because **[Bottom Line]** Jesus is a gift for everyone. Thank you for loving us. We love you! In Jesus' name, amen."



5. PARENT CUE BLOG FOR REFLECTION

BE KIND TO YOURSELF

"I'm a failure." "I'll never get it right." "I'm unlovable."

These are statements we would never say to someone we love, yet we freely say them to ourselves. And our kids do, too.

It's important to help our kids learn how to speak to themselves like they would to a close friend. We need to help them learn compassionate self-talk.

Self-compassion can be learned and developed over time. You can start by helping your kid retrain the voice in their head—which honestly, may begin with you retraining the voice in your own head.

Here's a simple phrase:

"Be kind to yourself."

When you look in the mirror and don't like what you see, say, "Be kind to yourself." When you mess up, burn dinner again, fail to close the deal, or miss the event, say, "Be kind to yourself."

Start with you. Let your kids watch you show yourself kindness. And then when they mess up, fail the test, get cut from the team, say to them, "Be kind to yourself. We all make mistakes or have moments when we aren't chosen. But that doesn't change our identity. It doesn't define who we are. What would you say to a good friend in the same situation?"

Start there. And continue to beat that drum of self-compassion.

I began saying the phrase: "Be kind to yourself" to my girls after watching their response to "failure." They would cry and quit. So, every time they messed up, I came behind them and said, "Be kind to yourself."

One night after I burned dinner, I felt the frustration rise in me. I reacted towards myself with shame, but behind me I heard a voice say, "Be kind to yourself, Mama. We all make mistakes. It will be okay."

The months of retraining the voice was beginning to show through. We are all humans who are bound to mess up or not get it right every time, but that doesn't mean we are less than.

Henry James said, "Three things in human life are important: the first is to be kind; the second is to be kind; and the third is to be kind."

Let's make kindness a key building block to our kids' identities, and ours too. When we live out of a place of kindness towards ourselves, then we can pass that kindness on to others.

Ask God to help you boldly approach His throne and ask for what you need.

DAY 3

What is something heavy in your room that you can't pick up by yourself? Ask someone stronger than you to come and help you. Are you able to lift it now?

What is something you struggle with? Have you ever asked God to show up and help you with it? Especially when it comes to things we know God wants us to do, like obeying our parents, being kind to others, being honest, and showing honor to others. If we are having a hard time doing those things, that gives God a chance to show up and help us. His grace means we're forgiven when we mess up, and we're strengthened when we're weak.
